

As always we have the problem of parking throughout the village. Donne Lane, both top and bottom, gets most complaints of selfish and dangerous parking. Please be considerate as to where and how you park.

In spite of having two handy litter bins at the Village Hall, the amount of litter thrown down is intolerable. The village is fortunate to have one lady who removes much of it as she walks her little white dog, but consideration by all Parishioners would be greatly appreciated.

An update on Ham Hill Country Park

Visitors to the Country Park will have noticed new fences being erected below the ice cream van car park and below the war memorial. These fences are part of the new Higher Level Stewardship scheme that Ham Hill is now part of. To protect the nationally important Iron Age earthworks the rangers and volunteers are carrying out woodland and scrub management on the slopes. By fencing these areas sheep can then be introduced to graze the land to prevent a return to scrub and then woodland. Woodland will be maintained

elsewhere in the Country Park where there isn't sensitive underlying archaeology. The fences and gateways have been designed to maintain public access. The ranger team will always erect sheep warning posters on these gates, so you know when to keep your dog on a lead. All the work is funded by Natural England as part of Ham Hill's Higher Level Stewardship scheme and is planned with the advice of archaeologists and ecologists to provide the best possible protection for the superb underlying archaeology and the existing site wildlife.

If you would like more information on the Country Park you could try our new web pages at www.southsomersetcountryside.com. Available on line now is the events programme for 2011 including information about coppice training workshops and Easter egg hunts at Ham Hill. From April 2011 we will publish online the results of a new Archaeological Management Plan that is currently being undertaken for Ham Hill by Wessex Archaeology, so if you have a particular interest in the heritage of the area take a look later in the year for a full gazetteer of the site.

Since the last newsletter we have been trying to play as many games as the weather would permit. At one stage we had a mid winter break enforced upon us, not playing a single game between 11th December and 8th January. We even had to postpone our Christmas Social at The Royal George as the weather for travelling to and from the venue was deemed too risky to try. The Christmas Social turned into a late January get together at the same venue and a good time was had by all.



On the pitch the First team had a run in the Somerset Intermediate Cup travelling to Wincanton Town (their best junior football team) and ran out 3-1 winners which gave us a home tie against Wells City A (another good junior team) who we managed to beat 3-2 with a last minute penalty by club captain Barry Facey. The

visitors must have been kicking themselves after that game as they missed quite a few decent chances to put the game beyond us but we kept plugging away and enjoyed the victory that much more.

This gave us a home tie against Sampford Blues of the Taunton league who had already seen off several Yeovil and District league teams in this cup, and we added to their list. Nathan Boon's early penalty gave us the lead but when they upped the pace of the game we found it hard to keep up with them and they eventually ran out 5-1 winners. So that was one cup we won't be parading this year.

The Charity Cup saw the first team lose 4-1 at Martock and in the Les King Cup the first team went out at Milborne Port 6-2 having had our keeper sent off just before half time for a hotly disputed professional foul (you know the one where the goalkeeper comes out to get the ball, the forward taps it past him then falls over even when the keeper doesn't touch him), no chance of an action replay! but the reserves are through to the 2nd round of both the Les King Cup (they had a bye) and The Hayward Cup (Martock Reserves couldn't field a team) without playing a game.

There are still the divisional cups to play for so all our Saturday's (weather permitting) should be busy. In the leagues both teams are mid table which is an achievement in its self as on previous seasons we are usually involved in relegation dog fights. Both managers Steve Cook and Liam Rogers have had their work cut out trying to get full teams plus subs each week but we have managed to put out competitive sides on most match days.

There has been a steady influx of new players but we are always on the look out for the next David Beckham so if you fancy a go come along to training (details on the website). We still retire to The Royal George at West Coker for our post match inquest and thank them for their hospitality. He Does What It Says On The Van!

Links with the Past


As Secretary to the Village Hall Committee for several years I 'inherited' an eclectic mix of historical paperwork for safe-keeping. These include transcripts of Parish Records and excerpts from the 1881 census. I wondered if residents of Odcombe old and new might be interested in some of the Social History of the village. I picked a name at random and traced both forward and back in time and this is what I came up with. **2011 is a Census year**

(Thomas Luckes was baptised in Odcombe

24th May **1752** son of John and Mary Luckes)

b = born

d = died



The 1881 census has an Elizabeth Frampton (? **Joseph's** wife) aged 65, occupation Publican (retired). She is listed as head of family with two grandchildren, Thomas aged 15 and Elizabeth aged 10, living with her at 8 Lower Odcombe. What happened after that? I am fairly sure I have recently spoken to descendants of William b. 1819 (underlined above) who lived in the village and were connected with the old Odcombe Inn.

As a timeline.....

- When in **1752** the Gregorian calendar replaced the Julian calendar there was a discrepancy of 11 days. Parliament decreed that when people went to bed on Weds. 2nd Sept. the next day would be Thurs. 14th Sept. There were riots because people thought they would be losing 11 days of their life. Did the people of Odcombe riot and how would they have known about it?
- From **1799 to 1815** The Napoleonic Wars. Would Odcombe men have gone to fight at the Battles of Trafalgar or Waterloo?
- Robert Stephenson was born in **1803** who with his father George designed the steam driven engine. Isambard Kingdom Brunel was born in **1806** and he was appointed chief engineer to the Great Western Railway in **1833**. If you watched the television series *Lark Rise to Candleford*, set at the end of the 19th century, you will have seen that this was a pivotal point in rural history. The close knit, peaceful rural community began transformation through agricultural mechanism, better communication and expanding towns.

All Saints Church of England Primary School



As ever the school continues to benefit from the local people and the community in so many ways. The governors and I are extremely grateful to all those members of the community who supported our 'Sponsor a Stone' Appeal, the new staff room and office area is complete. It is wonderful that the staff now have somewhere they can all sit down together and have a break! The children have also been enjoying cooking in this area, as there is more space for groups to cook than in the smaller kitchen area next to the hall.

We had to close the school on the last day of the autumn term due to the severe weather, which unfortunately meant that our Christmas Party had to be cancelled. So this Friday we are holding a Mad Hatter's Tea Party, we are linking the party with the World Book Day Celebrations, so don't be surprised if you see lots of book characters wandering around!

The children have been really busy attending many sporting events, such as Cross Country, Girls Football Tournaments, Boys Football Tournaments, Netball matches and tournaments. The children always play with great enthusiasm and with a superb sporting attitude, encouraging others and supporting all the members of the team. They really are a credit to All Saints.

The school submitted two applications to the Local Authority to link with partner schools one in London and one in France. We were overjoyed when we found out that both applications had been successful. Class 5 have established a link with Greenleaf Primary School in Walthamstow, London. The children will be looking at 4 key questions throughout the project, which are:

- Who am I?
- Who are we?
- How are we different?
- How can we live together?

Each child in Class 5 has a partner from Greenleaf Primary School. In January Class 5 went to Stonehenge to meet their partners, all the children really enjoyed the experience and learned a lot.

Our second link is with a school in France, one of our teachers Mrs Bridge went to France in November to visit the school and find out what school life was like. Our French link teacher Vanessa was due to visit us in February, but unfortunately she was unable to come due to a family bereavement. Mrs Bridge is working with Class 4; they have exchanged songs and various activities. This exchange is really helping the children to experience what life is like in France, they are able to ask questions and find out the answers to questions which they might not be able to find out in books or via the internet. We hope that Vanessa will be able to re-arrange her visit as we feel this will be very beneficial for the children at All Saints.



OUR SCHEME

Police are urging all those who store fuel to be extra vigilant. This includes businesses, schools, farms and residents. The rise in fuel prices may result in an increase in thefts of fuel, not only from fuel pumps and fuel tanks but from storage areas too. Below are some ways in which you can protect yourself from fuel theft:

Oil Storage Tanks

- Consider using 'bundled' fuel tanks if your existing storage facility is not of that type
- Install security lighting
- Site the tank so that it is visible from the house and as far away as possible from roads
- Make access to the tank as difficult as possible by using fencing with a lockable access gate or perhaps a thorny hedge
- Install cages and/or improve security that surrounds fuel storage tanks
- A remote oil level gauge situated in the house will give warning of any sudden drop in oil level by sounding an alarm
- Lock the filler cap using a good quality padlock
- Conceal or cover any external pipes and fuel lines
- Consider installing fuel cap and tank alarms
- Join a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme
- Security measures, which directly affect the tank or pipe work, should always be installed in consultation with the tank supplier
- Report any suspect activity to the police straight away
- Regularly check your fuel levels - sensors that monitor levels from inside the home are available

Car fuel

- Secure vehicles in a garage where possible
- Consider the use of locking fuel caps
- Re-fuel vehicles just before the planned journey rather than leaving a vehicle fully fuelled overnight

- Park vehicles in areas that are well lit so they can be observed easily
- Use secure parking areas or compounds when vehicles are parked overnight
- Consider the use of alarms
- Fit anti-siphoning devices
- Use defensive parking techniques (park with filler cap against a wall)
